A famous doctor was being interviewed by the press. Looking to spice things up a little, one reporter asked if the doctor had ever made any serious mistakes.




"Well, yes," he sighed. "I once cured a billionaire."

He is in control, patient and kind, so we submit to Him and offer our best.


Even though we don't know and may wonder what lies ahead...

Something to Think About...

"Flee from the love of money, the craving for the things of this world that lead us away from the faith; pursue instead righteousness, godliness, faith, love, steadfastness, gentleness." [from 1 Timothy 6:9-11]

When aspiring Hollywood actor, and now popular Christian speaker, Bruce Marchiano landed the role of Jesus in *The Gospel of Matthew*, he could never have imagined the awe-inspiring experience of walking in the footsteps of the Saviour.

To walk with Jesus requires we submit ourselves to who He is, to immerse ourselves in the essence of His character, to discover the impact of His choices and priorities, to follow His every action and word and make them our own. In other words, we need to set aside all pursuits which keep us from discovering what it is that lies at the root of who Jesus is and what He has done for us.

The first thing we learn is to flee from anything that would thwart our dependance on the Lord. The desire for wealth is sin! Money is a tool to be used for the Lord; its unmitigated pursuit, on the other hand – the need to be rich – focuses our hearts on material things in order to be happy and feel successful. But such riches are a trap; they lead to bondage, not freedom. They lead to additional lusts, unsatisfied desires, plunging us into ruin and destruction (1 Timothy 6:9 NIV).

There are times when fleeing is anything but cowardly. Joseph fled when he was tempted by his master's wife (Genesis 39:12), and David fled when King Saul tried to kill him (1 Samuel 19:10). The word 'flee', used by Paul here in 1 Timothy, rather than literal running, refers to separating ourselves from those things that can destroy us including the drawing away from false teachers. Not only riches, but secularization, false 'truths', failing to follow Christ are all things we should flee from. When an athlete trains for the race it's not only important to consider the route to follow but to set the mind on the race

and to set aside anything that might hinder the completion of that race that lays before the runner so that they can successfully complete it.

Such behaviour today, when it comes to Christian faith, is becoming rarer and is considered by many – both in the world and the church – as being intolerant or old-fashioned rather than being held up as the basis for our Christian life. But how can we pursue Christ and be found acceptable in His sight, welcomed into the eternal kingdom of our heavenly Father, unless we mirror the life of Christ and follow His precepts?

If we are to be true servants of God, we must be prepared to take a stand against false doctrine and godless practices, and separate ourselves from such pursuits which are harmful to us. We must ensure to act on the basis of Biblical conviction rather than popular opinion, on the basis of the Spirit of God over personal prejudice or a carnal spirit where anything goes.

But by separation I don't suggest we become isolationists. Separation without positive growth is what causes isolation. We must allow Christ to cultivate in us His grace which equips us for righteousness, godliness, faith, love, steadfastness and gentleness in our lives so that we're known for what we propose over what we oppose.

What does such a life, mirrored on Christ, look like? Righteousness means personal integrity that is constant whether anyone is looking or not and godliness has to do with His character dwelling in us through His Holy Spirit. Because we have God in us, and God is faithful, we call on His faithfulness to be faithful, having the ability to be dependable in our walk, displaying that

we "practice what we preach". Because of God's presence and our continual pursuit of His character building in us we draw on His agape' love that sacrifices for the sake of others, reaching out in faith to save others from a way of life that leads them to despair. It seeks to give and not to gain. That brings us to the need for God's great gift – patience and endurance –
