## 🛦 🐔 Something to Think About...

"Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change." (James 1:17)

To say that God is good means that God always acts in accordance to what is right, true, and good. God doesn't just behave well, showing goodness, His very nature is good. That God is good by nature means that there's no evil in Him; that His intentions and motivations are always good. He always does what's right, and the outcome of His plan is always good.

God's Word tells us not only that God is good and does good, but that His goodness extends from His nature to everything that He does. "The LORD is good and His love endures forever; His faithfulness continues through all generations" (Psalm 100:5). But what does that then mean for you and me? How are we impacted by God's goodness?

I remember many years ago considering the purchase of a sofa. The salesman came over and started telling me how much this sofa was what I needed in my home and then proceeded to make claims of it that just weren't possibly true. I didn't get the sofa; the salesman lost the sale. One of the tricks of the enemy, Satan, is to sell us a bill of goods that isn't true, working to convince us that God's holding out on us, that He can't possibly love and care for us or He would do whatever we ask, when we ask. When Satan approached Eve in the Garden, he suggested that if God really loved her, He would permit her to eat of the forbidden tree. When Satan tempted Jesus in the wilderness, he raised the question of hunger, "If your Father really loves you, why are you hungry?" He questioned God's goodness that He would let Jesus suffer in order to receive the Kingdom when Satan offered it to Jesus simply if He'd bow down to him – no cross required! We see the lie because, first, Satan didn't own what he offered, and secondly, Jesus always was heir to the

kingdom but "emptied Himself by becoming a servant...becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross" (Philippians 2:8). Too many times we let Satan have his way in our hearts because, like the Israelites of long ago, "They forgot what [God] had done, the wonders He had shown them" (Psalm 78:11). We forget His promises!

Since God is good, promising to give every good gift and every perfect gift from Himself in our time of need; and because God does not change, we don't need anyone else to meet our needs, including Satan. Warren Wiersbe wrote, perhaps considering the example of Jesus in the wilderness, "It's better to be hungry in the will of God than full outside the will of God."

As Christians, we believe that God is interested in the decisions we make, how we live our lives, the direction we take. If He's interested in our welfare, desires to give us every good and perfect gift, why is it so hard to discover His will for our lives? Sometimes we treat God like an automated information centre on which we push the right buttons and our need is met. But God wants to be involved with our lives through a relationship built in

faith and trust. In times when you seek His will, God intentionally draws you into a more intimate relationship with Him. As you diligently pray and come to a conclusion that not only shows you the direction to go but brings you peace, you emerge from the situation amazed at the goodness and grace of God. God is indeed good, His mercies never fail!

Only as we start to doubt God's goodness or fail to accept that He is forever the same of character, of goodness, are we attracted to Satan's ploys. The natural desires rise up within us and we submit. Such evil behaviour is the absence of the goodness of God because even when God has said no to our request, it's for our good; God knows the pain and suffering that we'll avoid if we obey our Father's will. Everything good in this world comes from God. And, if it comes from God, it must be good, even if we don't see the goodness in it immediately. All that Joseph went through was not always clear to him, but in the end, he could testify to his brothers, "You meant evil against me, but God meant it for good..." (Genesis 50:20). The value of a gift is measured by the intent of the one who gives the gift. When God gives His gifts to us, He does it in a loving, gracious manner because He is good. There is only one who is good - God! He invites you to seek Him and to "taste and see that the Lord is good; blessed is the one who takes refuge in Him" (Psalm 34:8).
