She answered, "Twice – so far!"


DANCING

An Something to Think About...

"For I will be merciful toward their iniquities, and I will remember their sins no more" ~ Hebrews 8:12

There are certainly many things which we want to remember. We save photos on our phones or in an album. We reflect on the good ol' days and find delight in our memories. We are blessed. But thank God there are things that He chooses to forget!

It's only through the sacrifice of Jesus Christ that forgiveness is possible to all who chose to believe in Him. The Old Testament brought a *remembrance* of sins, not the *remission* (cancelling our debt) of sin as we receive through the Lord. "*For this is my blood of the new testament, which is shed for many for the remission of sins*" (Matthew 26:28). Indeed, it's only through Christ's sacrifice of His own life that provides the ability for us to receive His forgiveness. In Acts, Peter tells a Roman named Cornelius that "*everyone who believes in [Jesus] receives forgiveness of sins through His name*" (Act 10:43). Cornelius and those in his home did believe, and they received forgiveness in Christ.

So, what does it mean that our Lord remembers our sins no more? Does it mean that our all-knowing, never-changing, God can actually forget the wrongs we've done? There are several passages in the Bible that indicate that God forgives and forgets our sin. Isaiah 43:25 says, "I, even I, am He who blots out your transgressions, for my own sake, and remembers your sins no more." And the prophet, Jeremiah, announcing God's promise that, "Behold, the days are coming, declares the LORD, when I shall make a new

covenant...", then proclaims God's promise, "*I will forgive their iniquity, and I will remember their sin no more*", of which the Hebrews writer then quotes many years later to apply to the rich redemption we have received in Jesus. Rather than treating us as our sins deserve, God removes our sins from us "*as far as the east is from the west*" (Psalm 103:12) — an immeasurable distance. Think of travelling around the globe. When does one stop going east and start going west? It is impossible to say. When we're saved, our sins are completely forgiven. That's what Hebrews is talking about — Jesus made a one-time, all-complete, forever, sacrifice completely removing our sin. God remits sin on the basis of Jesus' sacrifice on the cross (Romans 3:24-25); remission that only comes by grace through faith (Ephesians 2:8-9).

God is the original for "Out of sight, out of mind". The phrase, "*Remember no more*" means He'll "hold it against us no more!" Though God recalls our past mistakes, our wandering away, our sins, all that we have done or failed to do, He doesn't hold it against us. He deals with us on the basis of His grace and mercy, not law and merit. Once sin has been forgiven, it's never brought up before us again. The matter is settled eternally.

That's a lesson, we too can apply to our own lives. So often we hear, "Well I'll forgive, but I can't forget". That's natural. The more you try to forget, the more you'll remember every detail, right? But we can choose to not hold it against the person who has wronged us, to move on and not keep a record and treat them as though they never did what they did, said what they said, or failed to do what they said they that



would – because that's what God did for us; we're forgiven through the completed work of Christ our Lord and Saviour. Because of the cross of Calvary, we know that if we confess our sins, God is faithful to forgive, cleansing us of all unrighteousness (1 John 1:9) allowing us to stand before Him under the righteousness of His own Son, Jesus. Rather than hold our sins over us, He frees us from the slavery of sin; sets us free to experience a new life. We then can join King Hezekiah in praising our Redeemer: "You have put all my sins behind your back" (Isaiah 38:17). Like Paul, we can forget what is behind and "press on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called [us] heavenward in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 3:13). And in our experience of forgiveness from God, we can – we must – forgive one another.
