### THE JOB



"Above all, keep loving one another earnestly, since love covers a multitude of sins" ~ 1 Peter 4:8.

Our Lord has been pressing me these days to put every effort into loving others. I'm not talking about the emotional, usually selfish, emotions that Hollywood depicts or that magazines and TV fill our minds with thinking we deserve. The pop singer, Tina Turner made a hit out of asking, "Oh-oh, what's love got to do, got to do with it? What's love but a second-hand emotion?". That kind of philosophy only leaves us burdened with disappointment and regret. But Turner raises a good question - what does love have to do with it? Perhaps one of the most known verses in scripture is John 3:16 which simply displays our heavenly Father's love for us, "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have eternal life". Not only does this verse describe what God chose to do for us when we could do nothing for ourselves, but it defines what love is and demonstrates how we too are to love; to love one another as brothers and sisters; to love our neighbour as ourselves, and to even love our enemy.

The apostle John wrote, "God is love" (1 John 4:7), to remind us that as we have accepted Him as our Lord, we should demonstrate the same character that is His in the way we love. Love isn't something, then, that we 'fall into' so that we can just as easily 'fall out of'. Nor is it a whimsical feeling that can vanish the first time our egos are bruised. Love is a choice; one we make each day. It's the choice, first, to not be left to the so-called blindness of love because as Christians – Christ's followers – our lives are to constantly be in the allinclusive purpose of God. And that love is the divine element that encompasses our lives, fills us with God's presence, pours peace, kindness, patience and faithfulness with the leading of the Spirit in us (see Galatians 5:22-23 for fill list of Christian attributes). Because we've been so deeply loved by God,

there's a sacredness that must be nurtured as we have compassion for one another.

In essence, such love is the badge of the believer in this world. Jesus taught a new commandment, "that you love one another just as I have loved you…by this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another" (John 13:34-35). The apostle Peter encourages us to love earnestly or fervently, striving to reach the goal set before us, picturing an intensity in our actions of love for one another. Christian love requires we work at it the same way an athlete commits to developing his or her skills. It's a dedicated will that takes hold of one's emotions, committing to treat others the way

God treats us, obey His Word, so that, through His presence, we even love the people we don't like because we have made that choice to love.

Not only is Christian love fervent as a choice we make, but it's for-giving. Proverbs 10:12 tells us, "Hate stirs up strife, but love covers all offences." I'm not suggesting that Christian love condones sins – if we love, we also grieve for our brother or sister who sins; we are broken when they are hurt by their choices or when others are hurt by those choices. Rather, love covers sin as Godly love

motivates us to not tear down our brother or sister, not to use gossip to spread it around, and not to destroy them but to work to build them up in faith, to forgive and welcome them as they seek forgiveness, and, having forgiven, to no longer hold it against them. Let's face it we've all sinned and none of us can hide our sin from God. When Noah got drunk and shamefully uncovered himself, his son Ham told of it to the family, but his other two sons covered their father and his shame. What a picture of what Jesus Christ has done for each of us.

Our Christian love should not only encompass our fervent love for one another, and our forgiveness when our brothers and sisters falter, but it must also be practical. Love isn't love if it is not put into action. This requires humility, a willingness to look out and see the needs of others, and the courage to share what we are blessed with for those in need – generously, uncomplaining, sacrificially and without expectation of remuneration. We often refer to exhibition of such love as service. It's because of Christ who came from God to serve us and gave Himself for us that each of us must use the gifts we've received for the glory of God and for His church.
