THE COUNTRY PARSON


When the country parson bought a horse, the dealer assured him the one he selected was a perfect choice. "This horse was raised in a religious environment. So, you'll have to remember,

"Where your treasure is, there your heart will be also. No one can serve two masters...you can't serve God and money" ~ Matthew 6:21-24 It's been said, "Love is not finding someone to live with. It's finding someone you can't live without." I can't think of a better example of that then of the love shown to us by our heavenly Father. I don't know how I could ever live without Him since He became Lord of my life! I Love Him! It's easy to say 'I love you', harder to really mean it, and hardest of all to continually demonstrate it. But while we were hostile to him, ignoring him at best, and in total disobedience to him, God sent his own son, Jesus to take our place, pay for our wayward behaviour and make the way for us to have fellowship with the Creator of the universe. When Jesus taught that we were to seek treasure in heaven rather than storing up that which is so easily lost, stolen or destroyed here on earth, He understood that we needed the lasting treasure of God in our lives. As he is taken back to his younger days, Scrooge's wife is giving back the ring given when love still bloomed in Scrooge's heart, "I have seen your nobler aspiration fall of one by one, until the master passion – Gain –engrosses you" she tells him, then, as the viewer's heart breaks with hers, says, "If there had been no understanding between us, would you still seek me out and try to win me now, a dowerless girl with nothing but myself to bring to a marriage?" That doesn't mean that legitimate wealth is evil. God made all things and His Word tells us He knows our needs including food, clothing, housing, etc. And God saw what He made and declared all things good (Genesis 1:31). Jesus, though, warns against living for the things of this life, calling it sin! He reminds us of the sad consequences of idolatry and covetousness. We can't live two lives. Invariably, sin takes over when we give it free rain in our hearts. "What a man loves," said Martin Luther, "that is his God. For he carries it in his heart, he goes about with it night and day, he sleeps and wakes with it; be it what it may." Materialism enslaves not only our hearts but takes possession of the mind and the will. Let us beware of what holds us, lest we join the many, within the church, as well as without, who flatter themselves that all is right between them and God, while their closest attention, anxiety, zeal, and time are

exhausted upon these earthly pursuits. Our worldly possessions, acquisitions, and pursuits are always corruptible, vulnerable, and temporary when we make them our God. We chase them until they capture us. When the heart loves material things and puts earthly gain above heavenly investment, the result is always a tragic and eternal loss. Instead of being spiritually enriched, we settle for impoverished souls, darkness within, isolation from God. We need not fear wealth as God provides, but do not make it your God!
